The local elections are on Thursday 4 May 2023

The UK Government has introduced a requirement for voters to show photo ID when voting at a polling station at some elections. This new requirement will apply for the first time in England at the local elections on Thursday 4 May 2023.

Which forms of ID can I use to vote?

You may already have a form of photo ID that is acceptable. You can use any of the followina:

- Passport
- Driving licence (including provisional license)
- Blue badge
- Certain concessionary travel cards
- Identity card with PASS mark (Proof of Age Standards Scheme)
- Biometric Immigration document
- Defence identity card
- · Certain national identity cards

If you don't have an accepted form of photo ID


If you don't already have an accepted form of photo ID, or you're not sure whether your photo ID still looks like you, you can apply for a free voter ID document, known as a Voter Authority Certificate. You can apply for this at voter-authority-certificate.service. gov.uk.

Alternatively, you can complete a paper application form and send this to the electoral services team at your local council.

If you need any help with applying for a Voter Authority Certificate or want to request an application form, contact your local District Council. To find their contact details visit electoralcommission.org.uk/voter.

The Spring Coronation of King



akenheath will celebrate on Saturday May 6, when eight months on from his majesty's accession to the throne after the passing of his mother on the afternoon of September 8, last year, and for the first time since 1902 on a weekend, the coronation of His Majesty King Charles III will take place, where he will be crowned alongside his wife Camilla, The Queen Consort.

Although the coronation ceremony will take place at Westminster Abbev in London - the same location chosen for our late queen's State Funeral in September - where it will be conducted in part by the Archbishop of Canterbury - residents will be able to join the millions viewing broadcasts globally, even if they are not able to be among those thousands lining the streets of the capital.

It is expected that King Charles will travel from Buckingham Palace to Westminster Abbey in the Gold State Coach, like his mother, HM Queen Elizabeth II, did before him in June1953.

Coronation ceremonies have changed little in hundreds of years, but it has been suggested that King Charles prefers a shorter ceremony, with changes set to

reflect the monarch's role today and look towards the future, while still being rooted in long standing traditions and pageantry.

Among the expected changes to the ceremony, and to reflect Britain's increasingly diverse and multi-cultural society, will be an acknowledgement of other faiths alongside the Church of England. While the monarch will remain Fidei Defensor. Defender of the Faith, a title originally bestowed by Pope Leo X on Henry VIII, King Charles is also expected to pledge to help and support other religions.

Members of the royal family, the aristocracy, the Prime Minister, with members of the government and Parliament, heads of state from other countries and other royals from around the world will attend.

Monday, May 8 will be a 2nd spring bank holiday, and Prime Minister Rishi Sunak said it would allow people to "come together and celebrate" just as communities did more recently for the Queen's Platinum Jubilee celebrations in June last year.

Licensing hours will be relaxed to mark this occasion of exceptional national significance. and as the government has said, will see the country united in celebration across the bank holiday weekend.

Home Secretary Suella Braverman added: "Our country, and in particular our hospitality industry, has faced many challenges in recent years and the King's Coronation is an opportunity to give a boost to our local businesses, and celebrate with our local communities. Over the Bank Holiday weekend, we can raise a glass to our new monarch, and with our friends and families wish him a long and successful reign."



Lakenheath FC

LFC Manager's Assistant, Alan Gyte, brings us up to date with the team's progress - and a look back at its history!

In the spring of 2018, the club appointed

Ben Cowling as First Team Manager, and he has overseen a drastic overhaul of the club, both on and off the pitch. Having been fortunate to have been elected to Step 6 in the Eastern Counties League Division 1 North, we finished a creditable 5th. That season also saw the club make a significant investment in the club's facilities, including the addition of floodlights, new dugouts, and spectator hardstanding as the club achieved a 'G' ground grading from the FA.

Unfortunately, in the seasons 2019/20 and 2020/21 only a handful of games took place because of pandemic. The FA decided that on a points-per-game basis, we were promoted to the Thurlow Nunn Premier Division and Step 53 for the 2021/22 season for first time in the club's history. We finished in 12th place which was a fantastic achievement. We are of course looking to improve on last season and currently sit in 6th place.

The 'Heath was formed in the early 20th century, in the 1907/08 season. There's a bit of confusion about our original colours as there are a few 'original' shirts still around, including blue and gold stripes and black and gold quarters. Since those early days, we've changed colours a few times including green and yellow quarters, green with white trim, blue and black stripes, yellow and now we are at back to our 60's colours, dark green with a white trim.

We have also had various home grounds too, including somewhere close to the playing fields and also to the right of the community centre, the old British Legion. We arrived at the Nest around the time of the 2nd World War. After the chalk was quarried for the construction of local roads, the landowner, Sir Charlton Briscoe gave the quarry, also known as the Pit, to the village. on a long lease, to have a football pitch, and in the 1950's the current stand was built.

In the early 1960's, Sir Charlton sadly passed away and his son kindly offered the Pit to the football club for a 'very small fee' which was gladly accepted, and the place has grown since then.

We played in the early Ouse Valley League in the early years, and then the Essex and Suffolk Border League, winning the Suffolk Junior Cup in 1936/37, before becoming one of the founder members of the Anglian Combination League in the early 60's with our reserves playing in the Bury and District League.

In the late 1990's, the club joined the Cambs League where both teams played until 2017/18 and indeed our reserves are still in the Senior B League. Most of our success has come in the last 20 years, although our under 18 team won the Suffolk Minor Cup for the first and only time in 1970, and our first team won the Junior Cup again in 1974 and our reserves won back to back Suffolk Primary Cups in early 1990's.

The first team gained promotion to step 7 of the football pyramid in 2008/09 winning Cambs Senior A. For the next 9 years we finished in the top 3 of the Premier Division - 6 times winning the League in 2010/11 and winning the Cambs League Cup 3 times and the Suffolk Senior Cup in 2015 with a record 7-0 victory against Ipswich Valley Rangers in the final.

I believe we are one of only a handful of clubs that have won all county cups available to us, and are proud that we now qualify for the Premier Cup competition.

The team had always been a part of LYFC with manager Darren Gathercole taking over when the team were in the U10 season.

He has the help of Dave Edson and most recently, Darren Fulcher who joined us this season.

The decision was made last June to transition the oldest age group at Lakenheath Youth to Lakenheath FC to hopefully see the progression of some into adult football when they time was right.

Playing at The Nest is a big thing for the

team and something which they deserve.

This season, the team play in League One of the Norfolk Combined Youth Football League after coming runners up last season which saw them being promoted up a league.

The boys are going from strength to strength and are currently sitting second, just a point behind the league leaders.

The team would like to take the opportunity to thank John and Gemma Brooke of J Brooks & Sons for kindly sponsoring the kit for the team.

We play Sunday mornings if anyone would like to come down and support the team.

The future is bright for this bunch.

GREENER LAKENHEATH

Judy Cahill is a Councillor and leads on environmental issues for the Parish. Here she tells us about progress so far.

The Parish Council and local volunteers are working hard to improve our environment. Following the Neighbourhood Plan survey it was clear that we all want a cleaner, greener Lakenheath so a number of projects got under way.

The first of these included taking over the Mutford Green area as a Community Project. We have planted native trees and hedging which will eventually hide the electricity sub-station; having cleared the area, there was room to plant a memorial tree for the Queen's Jubilee. Lots of bulbs have been planted and the planters near the road now look the part. Further work is going to start later in the year clearing the brambles and the drainage ditch.

Part of the Neighbourhood Plan is to smarten up the High Street and hopefully persuade drivers that they are actually in a village and should slow down! So we are creating a 'Green Gateway' at each end of the Village centre.

Around the Lakenheath sign we have put in about 3000 bulbs which should give us a great display fairly soon; as the weather improves we will be sowing wildflowers to take over as the bulbs die down. On the other side of the road is the rather less than lovely BT building. We have agreement in principle to manage the area around the building and we are working with BT to firm up our plans.

At the other end of the High St - around the Dumpling Bridge Lane junction - we have planted yet more bulbs, and as the weather improves, we will be putting in more of the shrubs donated by the Woodland Trust.


We are constantly on the lookout for sites which need tidying up and the landowner is prepared to let us improve matters. You may have noticed that the flower beds at the entrance to the Cemetery and around the Chapel have been cleared and replanted.

While the Parish Council is doing as much as it can, Lakenheath in Bloom is a new volunteer group who are busy buying and installing tubs and benches around the centre of the Village and by the Surgery.

Of course, 'gardening' is only part of the story and four times a year we organise a Litter Pick around the village. While it is disappointing how much litter there is, we are always both surprised and pleased at how much of it we manage to collect!

If anyone has ideas about other areas we could use to help improve our environment please get in touch with us at the Parish Council, and if you feel you could help with any of our projects or litter picks everyone is always welcome. We are very grateful to all those who have helped us so far and look forward to more residents joining us in our fun and really worthwhile projects!

Exciting Times in Sprin at Lakenheath Fen

There is plenty to enjoy here at RSPB Lakenheath Fen in Spring. Writes RSPB officer Heidi Jones. As well as all the changes in wildlife, it is magical to watch the reserve become a brighter shade of green, to watch wildflowers appear and to listen to a wealth of birdsong. If you have a spare day, or even half a day, why not pop down and spend some time here? By the beginning of March, the first signs of Spring will be noticeable wherever you are- crocuses and daffodils flowering on roadside verges whilst small birds like robins and blackbirds pair up and sing in gardens. Whilst we don't have the Spring bulbs, we do have the birds and one of the first changes we notice is the increase in variety of wading birds on the Washland. Already (on 7 February) a few avocets have turned up and during March we can expect to see other species such as dunlin, ruff and black-tailed godwit in small numbers. These don't come to the reserve to breed but use us as a pitstop to refuel on their long migration to their breeding grounds. March, as a result, is a fantastic time to see some more unusual waders without having to travel far from home!

April will also bring more migrant birds to us, including the swallow, house martin and cuckoo. It will also be the month when bitterns 'boom' their low, deep calls from within the reedbeds more frequently. Through March we may hear some booming but it really gets regular in April, especially on sunny, calm mornings. Other highlights to enjoy will be aerial displays from marsh harriers. Male birds

will be turning, twisting and diving

in energetic displays over reedbeds, designed to show females how capable they are of chasing prey and of their general agility. You may also see 'food passes' from males to interested females, again to demonstrate a very important skill- that males are capable of catching and delivering plenty of food. April normally sees the first butterflies and dragonflies become airborne on fair days. Numbers of these larger insects quickly build up and together with the mass emergence of the clumsy, black (but harmless) St. Mark's flies, they will provide a feast for the hobbies arriving from Africa. These elegant falcons (with a conspicuous red patch of feathers around the base of the legs) look like miniature peregrines and numbers can rise to around 50 birds here by the end of May. At this point, the hobbies begin to disperse to their breeding grounds across the UK and our numbers drop to two or three pairs which stay to breed with us for the summer.

Lakenheath Parish Council are delighted to announce: The Freedom of Lakenheath is awarded to LAWRENCE GRAEME VAUGHAN COOK

The Parish Council has the power to grant Freedom of the Parish to individuals who have given very exceptional service to the village and the wider Parish. On the 24th February. Ed Morley (the only other recipient of this honour) presented Graeme with his decorated scroll in a small ceremony at his home. Apart from Graeme's family and friends the ceremony was attended by CIIIr Jenny Hastings, Vice Chair of the Parish Council and Cllr Peta Gyte.

Lawrence Graeme Vaughan Cook was born on 19th March 1918 at Oulton Broad Lowestoff Suffolk. In 1923, he arrived in Lakenheath with his parents and his brother and sister. Stanley and Gwenda, and lived in Undley Hall, which had been bought by West Suffolk Council and split into smallholdings.

Graeme has many recollections to share. In 1926, when he was about seven years old, he was sent to Liverpool to live with his aunt and uncle, as it was thought at the time that this might improve his future, and he returned to Lakenheath only for holidays. He was enrolled in a school in Allerton. Saturdays were very special as he was given four old pennies and was able to go to the Garston Empire cinema. In 1928 he returned home to Lakenheath.

During this time, he helped his father after school with the dairy herd and the smallholding and with the harvest during summer holidays. In 1931 the family moved into a small cottage in Broome Road where his father rented pasture with grazing facilities. In 1932, on leaving school at

fourteen, he got a part time job as an apprentice to the local butcher. At sixteen he went to Cambridge and then St. Albans to continue his apprenticeship with Sainsburys.

In 1945 after ten years away, five of them as a butcher manager, and five in the Auxiliary Fire Service during the war, he returned to Lakenheath. to take over the management of his father's business. He was hoping to create a pedigree Friesian herd, but circumstances made this impossible. so he decided to buy milk wholesale already bottled. And thus began Cook's Dairy Milk Round.

The same year he met his wife Joyce, who was from London and serving in the Land Army in Lakenheath. They married in 1947 and lived in Broome Road, where their three children were born. The business moved to 63 High Street in 1967 and became Cook's Dairy from where it operated until it was sold in 1980 and Graeme and Joyce moved to a bungalow in Woodlands, Graeme continued to work as a butcher, first at the Coop, and later with Yallops butchers until he retired at the age of eighty. Over the years he immersed himself

in the Lakenheath community. Joyce and he joined Lakenheath Amateur Dramatic Society, he served as Chairman of the Village hall committee, he belonged to the bowls club, the Rotary Club and served on Lakenheath Parish Council for many years. He was a regular church goer and worshipped at the Methodist Church until he was 102 years old when all outings were cancelled due to Covid.



Over the years Graeme organised many annual village carnivals and could bee seen riding a horse at the front of the parade, leading the floats through the village, dressed differently every year. He was always involved in Lakenheath life, be it as the dame in the annual pantomime, old time music halls. talent shows, dances, jumble sales and singing to the residents of Lakenheath Village Home.

Graeme will reach the wonderful age of 105 on 19th March and continues to be as cheerful and positive as ever. He has great memories of his life in the place he chose to make his future with Joyce, his wife of 72 years, three children and their partners, six grandchildren and nine great grandchildren (with another on the way).

Graeme says that he attributes his happiness in life to the happy environment he found in Lakenheath when he first arrived at the age of 5, and over the years that grew into dedication and lovalty to the village. He has contributed so much throughout his long life and truly gave very exceptional service.

All Lakenheath congratulates Graeme on this much-deserved award!

Ready. Set. Grow!

Spring Gardening by Rachel Sobiechowski BSc. (Hons)

Spring is here at last. It's been a cold winter, with prolonged spells of temperatures below freezing causing damage to our garden plants, particularly those that originate south of the equator. The cordylines in our garden have been devastated. However, all is not lost. Plants can recover as long as their roots haven't frozen or become waterlogged. Species that are only partially frost hardy such as Hebe, Choiysa (Mexican orange blossom) and Euonymus can now be pruned to remove any damage. This may mean you end up with a very lopsided plant, so prune back some of the undamaged growth too to promote even new growth. You may want to move these plants but its best to wait until Autumn to do this. Don't forget after pruning to give the shrubs a good feed with a granular fertiliser such as growmore, or fish, blood and bone. I'm afraid though that if the centre growth of your cordyline has been damaged and is mushy or mouldy, it's unlikely to recover, although sometimes (especially if they flowered last year) they send up new shoots or seedlings from underground.

Whether we like it or not, climate change is shaping our gardens at the moment, and it's the extremes of weather that do the damage. Drought in summer may lead you to think that more tropical species are more suited to the climate, but when winter comes around these plants need protection to ensure they survive. The key is to look for species that can deal with these extremes in weather, resilient plants

that tolerate a wide range of conditions from summer drought to winter flooding. These plants are actually quite rare so it's a learning curve for us all!

If you didn't get round to pruning your hedges or trees recently, please don't consider doing it now that birds are nesting. As well as dealing with winter damage, here are a few more tasks to do this spring!

March:

- Plant early potatoes outside
- Mow lawns and apply lawn fertiliser.
- Hoe weeds to keep them under control.
- Top dress containers with slow-release fertiliser and fresh compost.
- Keep an eve out for aphids and other garden pests and deal with accordingly.
- · Primroses, Polyanthus, Dianthus, and Pansies will all provide fantastic colour from now until May (when they can be replaced with summer annuals).

April:

- Protect fruit blossom from late frosts.
- Sow seeds of hardy annuals, herbs and wildflowers directly where they are to flower.
- Keep a ball of twine handy and tie in new growth of climbers particularly Clematis and Honeysuckle which grow rapidly.
- Leave your spring bulbs to die down naturally, don't be tempted to cut back or tie up foliage. Lift & divide any congested clumps which didn't flower.

Community support


We know a few of our families are 'feeling the pinch' with the increased cost of living. We are working with EPIC dad to support our school community with provisions.

LAKENHEATH HERITAGE SOCIETY

Looks at the ancient connection between Lakenheath and Ely. 673 -1109 CE.

In a nutshell:

- 673 Queen Etheldreda founded a religious enclave at Ely.
- 870 Ely Abbey was sacked by the Danes.
- 900 There was a landing place at Lakenheath at the edge of the Fen. The Hythe.
- 1003 Lakenheath was given to the monks by Edward the Confessor.
- 1010 The Battle of Thetford. Vikings advanced into the Fens.
- 1061 Pilgrimages to the shrine at Walsingham began.
- 1066 Ely continued to hold the lordship of the village after the Norman Conquest.
- 1086 The Little Domesday Book showed Lakenheath to be a large village of 24 households.
- 1109 Ely Abbey became a cathedral, and the monks began the re-building of St. Mary's Church.

When he became King in 1003, Edward the Confessor gave the monks of Ely the village and lands of Lakenheath so that the Ely Abbey became the Lord of the Manor of Lakenheath.

A 'manor' was not a building but an area of land, which together with the people who lived on it, owed 'service' to its Lord. A very small number of 'freemen' were exempt from manorial service, but not from the payment of rents and taxes. There were also a few slaves who worked solely for the manor and had no rights - but were not taxed... Most of the villagers therefore had to provide manorial service but in return they had certain rights. Manorial 'service' meant regular work by the inhabitants to provide for the abbey's needs. It has been suggested that surnames such as 'Munday' come from this time, the name being the day of the week on which

manorial work had to be done. Under the Normans the abbey retained the Lordship of the manor, and the Prior of the Abbey was effectively the Lord of the Manor. A bailiff, who lived in the village, managed the land, controlled labour and collected taxes. Very little, if anything, changed for the villagers under the Normans. Lakenheath was a large village for the time, and it was very important to the abbey. Not only did it provide a wide variety of food for the monks and money from the sale of sheep's wool, but rents had to be paid by the peasants for their homes and land, classes in England after the conquest of 1066 until around the 15th C. The computation of the payment of tithes and rents was very important to the Abbey. Just as a bailiff was necessary to run the manor estate, so the Prior of the Abbey needed a vicar to fulfil his religious duties. The vicar and

church depended on the collection of a tax (the tithe) for their up-keep. The first recorded vicar was John de Cadsby in 1226. The demands of rents and taxes could cause great hardship to the villagers when prolonged bad weather seriously affected harvests and payment of 'service' was generally strictly enforced. It's worth remembering that as well as Lakenheath, Ely Abbey was the lord of a large number of manors throughout other parts of East Anglia and southern England and was consequently very powerful.

When humankind was first exhorted to 'Love thy neighbour' it was not made in English or American but spoken by Jesus who was quoting Moses in Hebrew or Aramaic. It was written down some vears after in Hebrew. Greek and Latin. And when William Tyndale printed the first English language bible around 1523 from Wycliffe's earlier translation in 1382 that wrote it out as neivbore, he printed it as Love thy Neighbor. It wasn't until the King James version, that used more than 70% of Wycliffe's Old English translation, that 'neighbor' became 'neighbour' and became the standard English spelling. Now we have different spellings and different names in American English and British English for quite a few objects too with faucet for tap, crisps - chips, cookies - biscuits, closet - wardrobe and continuing the food theme, Sprinkles are becoming more familiar to those who still call them Hundreds and Thousands and menus in England have 'starters' more often than the customary appetizers! And in punctuating our written language, period means a full stop.

As for anticlockwise to counterclockwise - it may be a different expression of the direction speed skaters negotiate a track, short or long, but both terms describe a common heritage. Ice speed distance skating began on the fens of England in East Anglia and so did the 11 a side game of bandy, that was adapted when the first indoor small ice pads were built, on both sides of the Atlantic, to ice hockey and indoor aka short track speed skating.

The RAF Lakenheath USAF air base is a neighbor to Lakenheath village for whom it has been a neighbour for half a century. As the Stars and Stripes fly outside

many homes in the village, and the strains of both the American and United Kingdom National Anthems are heard being played at the base every day at the specified time for Retreat we can say these are good neighbors and good neighbours indeed.

Neighbourhood Planning update

t is a while now since the last update, and there have been two reasons for that. The first is that, as we reported earlier, we have been trying to work with West Suffolk Council, so that our Plan meshed with their 'Local Plan'. Unfortunately we have heard recently that the Local Plan has been delayed again: this means that any advantage of a shared timetable is now lost. So we intend to crack on and let them catch up!

The second reason is that we have been working on the Regenerating High Street Project. This has been a big piece of work looking at ways we can improve the look, safety and convenience of the High Street. We have the government funded report from AECOM (who worked with us on the Housing Needs Assessment and the Design Code) and that has prompted further work from Traffic and Design specialists. Much as we would love to make it all happen overnight, it won't. What it will do is produce a list of priorities for the future, and as a target for Developer Contributions, sometimes known as Section 106, or Community Infrastructure Levy money. All these documents are

available on **www.lakenheath.org**. One thing which is not a matter of expense is the proposal to have a 20mph zone – that is matter of convincing Suffolk County Council Highways that we do consider it a necessity. We really must not wait for someone to be killed before any action is taken. Please make sure Cllr Noble has the ammunition to make the case to the County Council.

Before we received the report we had already started work on some of the issues which we knew would be down to us anyway, and our "green gateways" at Dumpling Bridge Lane and the Village sign are looking much better already. The Outdoor Gym is a success and is being well used, and the other 'mini-projects' are well on the way.

We are now putting together the mass of detail that we have to, and hope by the end of Summer to be showing you our draft Plan and asking what you think of it.
