From Gerald Kelly Chair of Lakenheath Parish Council

There really is a lot going on! West Suffolk Council is now run by a mix of Independents, Labour, Liberal Democrat and the Green party. This was unexpected and extraordinary, but those involved have agreed that District Councillors are there to do what is right rather than just follow a Party line imposed by someone who doesn't know the area. What is lacking in experience (especially with your two new Councillors!) is being made up with enthusiasm, and things are already progressing. Two of the new Council's priorities - sorting out the grass cutting mayhem and street lighting - are well under way. Both Tracy and I do have to ask for your patience in sorting out issues because West Suffolk is a big and complex organisation so finding the right people to give us the answers can be a bit of a task. But we are learning very quickly!

The Parish has two new Councillors in Denise Smith and Mike Rowntree who have brought their own skills and enthusiasm into the mix. Both Councils are working hard to find ways to improve things for residents but we do have a cost of living crisis, and we don't want to get into expensive loans. So like everyone else it's a case of looking very hard at current and planned

spending to make sure we're getting the best value for tax payers' money.

The biggest projects we have in the village now is Neighbourhood Planning and particularly High Street Regeneration. Up to now that has all been funded by central government, and that funding has come to an end, although the current work won't suddenly come to a halt. The really good news is that once we got Suffolk Highways to come and see the issues, they have agreed that some work is essential and beyond that they will cooperate with our consultants. There are strict rules about what they can class as essential (to be funded by Suffolk County Council). Whatever we do will cost a great deal, so we are now looking for some substantial grant funding to ensure that we can address the major issues of safety and parking on the High Street.

And finally for all our clubs and organisations. West Suffolk have funds available for next year in the Community Chest. The minimum grant is £2500, and the closing date for applications is 23rd September this year so not much time left! If you have any questions or want help with your application, give us a call...



Autumn Gardening 2023

Autumn has arrived and the nights are starting to draw in. Autumn is a special time to be a gardener, allotments (and veg growing areas) are brimming with fruit and vegetables to be harvested and the soil is the perfect temperature for planting.

Mulching your flower borders

Most of us sadly lost garden plants last winter due to the week of harsh frost in December. One way to help plants survive through winter is to mulch to insulate roots.

If your home-made compost is ready to use it can be spread on the soil between plants to hold in moisture and feed your plants. If you don't make your own compost, you can purchase bags of compost, bark, or manure to do the same purpose. You can clear dead stems and foliage now too although in my opinion it is best to leave them standing until spring to provide habitat for insects and to provide extra insulation.

Weedy beds will need clearing before mulching which can be hard work. You could try covering empty beds with cardboard. The cardboard will block out the light from any weeds and cause them to die back. This will make it much easier to dig in spring. Alternatively, you can sow green manures, these crops are grown on bare ground either in spring or autumn and dug into the soil a few months later. This method enriches the soil and improves the structure.

Harvesting fruit and vegetables

Now is the time to get over to the allotment or vegetable patch to collect what you can from the last of the summer crop before the cold weather comes. Autumn crops such as apples, pears, squash and leeks should all be ready to start harvesting now.



Any bare plots can be sown with winter salad crops such as mizuna, rocket and winter lettuce.

Planting bulbs and sowing seeds

Nows the time to plant spring flowering bulbs including tulips, crocuses and daffodils. They can be planted in pots or in flower beds. If you have a large area of grass try planting crocus bulbs in drifts for a vibrant colour show in early spring, the bees will thank you.

You can also sow seed of hardy annuals in early autumn, including cornflowers, scabious and ox-eye daisies.

Clearing leaves

When the leaves start to fall and the season heads into mid to late autumn it's a good idea to clear leaves from lawns and flower borders. Keep the leaves to make leaf mould to feed next year's plants. Do this by piling leaves in wire cages and leaving them to break down. If vou're tight on space use strong bags tied at the top and add puncture holes near the base for air to circulate. This makes a good mulch to use on your plants next year.

Removing all leaves from around roses is also a good idea as the leaves can harbour diseases, including blackspot, during the winter. These need to be incinerated (not composted) otherwise you risk the diseases remaining in the compost you've created.

Other Top tips for Autumn:

- Clip conifer hedges. If you leave this too late any new growth will be damaged by frost.
- Plant evergreen shrubs whilst the soil is
- Plant winter flowering pansies & violas in tubs & baskets for a splash of colour.

LAKENHEATH HERITAGE GROUP

The Beginnings of Prosperity.

In a nutshell:

The Prior of Ely Abbey is the lord of the manor receiving taxes and tithes from villagers.

1380's The village has recovered from the Black Death.

- 1400 A large rabbit warren is established east of the village. Cattle and sheep are grazed on common land. Cereals are cultivated in strip fields to the east between the village and the warren. Fish and waterfowl are caught and sent to the Abbev.
- 1400 There is a piece of land in the village which became known as Camping Close.
- 1460 St. Mary's Church has two new bells to add to the others in the tower.
- 1483 New benches (pews) or 'stooling' is paid for by better off villagers. A new illustrative paint scheme is added to St Mary's covering up earlier schemes.
- 1539 Ely Abbey is dissolved: its lands and wealth passed to the Crown.

By the end of the 14th century things had settled down after the upheavals of the Black Death and the later Peasants' Revolt which was widespread in this region. Most villagers (villeins) still had to work for the Abbey for some part of the week but a few better off free peasants, (freemen), were able to pay a cash rent instead which gave more time to work for themselves. The 'tithe' payment was an additional one tenth tax, most often paid in 'kind', which was levied on all but the poorest for the upkeep of the church.

The Black Death had massively reduced the population of the village causing a labour crisis which significantly reduced the Abbey's income from its manor at Lakenheath. With fewer villeins to

work the land, rent paid in cash gave the monks some protection from the reduced output of their lands through labour shortages or bad harvests, but there was an advantage for the peasant as well. Unproductive manor land or fen could be leased and produce sold in local markets. One effect of this was that more enterprising peasants could take on more land which reduced their obligation to manorial service whilst at the same time providing security of income to the abbey. These tenancies became known as 'copyhold tenancies' and they remained a feature of rented land there until the 19th century.

The village freemen or commoners were well placed to take advantage of the abbey's need for income. These successful copyholder tenants were the 'commoners' of the village, leasing manor land on which sheep were grazed and fen where eels were plentiful. Wool was the most valuable product of the time and by the mid15th century several copyholders had become well off.

Other villeins profited from a special skill, providing the village population with ale or bread or by blacksmithing or carpentry. Other ways were found, carting produce to a market, or labouring making lime from the lime pit or sand from certain places nearby. Almost all families found ways of making extra money to supplement income and it became usual to have more than one way of making a living. Almost every villein continued to work on the land but one way or another some had a little disposable income.

Because copyhold tenancies could be extended land could be kept in the family. In a comparatively short time it was possible to become wealthy enough to employ local labour and to take on further tenancies, then, after the dissolution of the Abbey in the reign of Henry VIII (1539), the manor reverted to the Crown and land could be purchased by those with sufficient money, or the lease could be renegotiated.

With personal wealth came influence and a few had money enough to enjoy the luxuries of the day, clothes of finer cloth, wine, books for those who could read. a larger house with a 'bed' room or two, with glass windows and a chimneyed fireplace, and so on. A relatively new social class- merchants, were on hand to supply such luxuries and many more.

By the end of the 15th century tenant farmers were important figures in the

village with money to make gifts to the Church and to make significant beguests. Some of them had begun to purchase land outright. A further social class had arisen- the yeoman farmer.

The feudal period was ending, to be succeeded by the beginnings of capitalism.

*Bequests. These are just a few of the wills of the period researched by the Rev. John Munday. It was usual to leave money to the church for the singing of prayers for their soul over a period of years.

- 1446 Gilbert Dowe. To Margaret his wife the whole tenement in which I dwell.
- 1483 William Lacy. 6 marks for the 'stoolyng' of the church of St. Mary the Virgin.
- 1498 John Man. 12 acres of land to Thomas Mann.
- 1497 Thomas Gigner. Repairs to St Mary's 5 marks, and 'to every house of friars in Thetford 10 shillings.

LAKENHEATH HERITAGE GROUPTHE BELLS OF SAINT MARY'S



he Church of St Mary the Virgin holds much of Lakenheath's heritage and not least two of her ring of six bells, the third and fourth bells were both cast at John Danyells foundry in London circa 1460 and the third bell weigh's in at 6 hundredweight and 3 pounds, rings in the note of B flat not entirely in harmony with her five sisters but hardly noticeable to the untrained ear she is inscribed in Latin Sanctus Kalerrina ora Pro Nobis (May Christ give us the joys of eternal life), third and fourth are both inscribed with the Royal coat of arms.

The fourth bell over two hundredweight heavier at 8 Cwt 2qrs & 9Lbs is inscribed Ariftus Perpetue Det Nobis Gaudia Vite.

Money was bequeathed for these two bells by a local Farmer John Horold in 1454 the story goes that he also paid for the ladder that leads up the tower it is believed to be that original ladder still in use today, the date of 1624 is carved in its side with the initials RD, the dates do not coincide, who was RD a mystery?

It is quite amazing considering the life of so much that is manufactured in our throw away world, to think that these bells were cast in the reign of King Edward the 4th some 560 years past, over all of these years they have called people to Church given warnings celebrated peace jubilees Coronations and still ring regularly today.

The heavy going plain bearings on the back five were replaced with ball bearings around twenty years ago by a local business man and the tower captain at no cost, ringing became so much easier.

The fifth bell at 10 Cwt 3qrs & 19 Lbs cast in 1697 and inscribed, John Parsley Vicar, & Charles Newman made me, the Vicar made a monetary donation towards the casting of this (then the fourth bell) the Churchwarden at that time was Thomas Kitchener of the Earl Kitchener family.

The tenor bell the heaviest at 13Cwt 3qrs & 21Lbs inscribed Thomas Denton and James Parlet Churchwardens, this bell now requires some professional attention, for many many years the ringers have cared for the bells without cost.

Until 1915 St Mary's had a ring of five bells the then treble bell (now the second) 5Cwt & 3Lbs was recast by Alfred Bowell of Ipswich and hung in the new metal frame engineered by the same company at a cost of £137-00, in 1946 the new treble bell at 4Cwt & 3qrs was hung in the space provided in the metal frame in celebration of the ending of the second world war at a cost of £126-12-6.

Mr Robert Dent came to Lakenheath in 1936 and served as the local school's headmaster for many years, he was a proficient ringer of Church bells a lay reader and he brought the skill of method ringing to Lakenheath teaching the local band of ringers the art, on Wednesday evening October 27th 1948 the first quarter peal of 1260 changes recorded on Lakenheath bells was rung by:



WNAS June 2023 Meeting

Thompson man, Mark Burch, could easily have headed his CV, 'Forty-Six Years in Air Traffic Control' before presenting his talk to the WNAS on the 6th instant.

Like so many boys, Mark had an early ambition to fly. He joined the ATC (Air Training Corps) at Bournemouth in 1976 and learned to fly gliders but his eyesight would never allow him to fly professionally (Wg Cdr Ken Wallis, late president of the WNAS, might have given him some advice on eye test dodges). So, Mark became another ATC (Air Traffic Controller).

He gradually developed his career serving at various famous aeronautical locations like: Cranworth and Shawbury. Then he came our way and did more time at Honington and Watton's Eastern Radar establishment. He spoke of his time at Mildenhall, helping to organise the annual air shows, juggling the performances of regular visitors with the encrypted flight plan of a classified arrival: after refuelling in the North Sea it began its return to Mildenhall at Mach 3. No prizes for quessing: The Blackbird.

In one breath Mark mentioned Bloodhound Radar and height finders; one wonders

whether he had control over low flying missiles as well?

He spent further time at Wattisham controlling the behaviour of helicopters over the North Sea and proudly boasted that this airfield was a close second in prominence to Aberdeen in its involvement with North Sea oil fields. He made a personal comment that the army were better helicopter flyers than the air force (Chuck Pettitt, a former WNAS member, would have loved to hear that). Why did he say this? Perhaps he regretted not having spoken to Ken first.

After retiring from the RAF in 1997 he went back to Bath Flight Training Academy, in an attempt to obtain commercial flight recognition. Here he found the syllabus identical to the one he had undertaken after joining the RAF.

His fame circulated the grapevine and very soon received an invitation to attend an interview at Norwich Airport. He was recruited before getting through the door and stayed there until his retirement about a year ago. He now holds the equally challenging position of Club Secretary at the WNAS. (NJT)

WNAS July Meeting with a difference!

A last-minute change of destination saw a small, yet enthusiastic, expedition from the WNAS, head for the heritage centre at the former RAF Bircham Newton.

Our thanks must firstly go to the curator of the heritage centre, Jamie, for accommodating us at such short notice and making everyone feel so welcome.

The heritage centre has recently undergone a revamp that now sees dedicated rooms to WWI, the inter-war years, WWII and post war periods.

RAF Bircham Newton opened just a month after the inception of the Royal Air Force in 1918. Designated as a bomber airfield, it was equipped with 3 Handley Page V/1500s the largest of the British aeroplanes.

The inter-war years saw RAF Bircham Newton used as a bomber training station where some of the higher echelons of WWII cut their teeth. The status of a training station ensured it was kept operational throughout these years, at one point being the only operational RAF station in Norfolk.

WWII saw Coastal Command take charge and the arrival of Swordfish, Anson, Hudson and Wellington aeroplanes with several other types having shorter stays throughout the war.

Jamie regaled us with stories of both heroism and tragedy. The Canadian crews in particular seemed to suffer heavy losses. Jamie explained crews were often asked to carry out operations over the enemy coast where their slow moving, outdated aeroplanes were easy pickings for the German fighters. There are several recorded incidents of entire raids being wiped out with the loss of nearly all aircrews.

In 1966 RAF Bircham Newton closed and was handed over to the Construction Industry Training Board and latterly West Suffolk College.

The site itself is remarkably well preserved with many original buildings still intact; however, access is strictly limited due to the on-going activities of the Construction College.

If you get the opportunity to visit, it's well worthwhile, just to listen to Jamie's knowledge if nothing else. All who attended expressed a wish to return for a further visit in the future.

Andy Phipps was our quest speaker with special permission from RAF Lakenheath Fire Department who granted him relief from duties in order that he could attend this special occasion. Andy exuded confidence and authority which must have developed at an early age; from a determination to succeed. He grew up in Shoeburyness, gained few formal qualifications and after various shore based jobs leading nowhere he became obsessed by the idea of a naval career and eventually got it. He served time in the Falklands safeguarding fuel stations. After he returned home, this newfound experience led him to a fire service training centre in Cambridge which, in turn, led him to the Fire Service at Lakenheath. He now spearheads a crew of about 40 Brits and 100 Americans: this might sound like a metaphor for some of the equipment he uses: fire engines with armour piercing water nozzles designed to extinguish fires inside crashed aeroplanes but,

with sufficient control to prevent the drowning of the occupants. This equipment together with a number of other fire fighting vehicles, each costing not much less than \$1 million apiece, complete the ensemble. Despite the proactive procedures necessary to fight fire, he stressed the point that as much goes into fire prevention as it does into fire fighting.

It is with great sadness that the WNAS reports the passing of one of our members: Roger Burrows from Watton had a small factory unit at Threxton where he built and piloted 7/10 scale replicas of inter-war biplanes. We were all looking forward to the maiden flights of a Hawker Fury and an SE5 but alas, it was no to be. He gave a presentation a few years ago at our bowls club meeting place and invited members of the society to a party at his workshop - memories to be treasured! **Nigel Tooth**

elcome to Central Garage Lakenheath's car care series for Lakenheath Times! In this edition, we will highlight the importance of monitoring your coolant levels and condition. As we always say, prevention is much cheaper than fixing a problem later on.

It's critical to keep an eye on your coolant levels and not solely rely on the temperature gauge or warning light. Safety should always come first, so ensure that you check your coolant on level ground and with the engine cold. If your car has been running and is still warm, do not attempt to open any of the lids or caps on the radiator, as this could result in severe burns caused by hot liquid or steam spurting out.

It's essential to keep an eye on your coolant level and notice any fluctuations. The coolant lives in a pressurized, sealed system, and the level should not change



drastically. If you see a drastic change, such as a pool of fluid under your car or the temperature gauge shooting towards the red zone, switch off the engine as soon as it's safe to do so and let the car cool down.

Although checking coolant levels may differ between car models, most cars come equipped with a header tank. It has a see-through tank with a lid on it. making it easy to check the fluid level. You will also find the "min" and "max" levels on the side of the tank. If the level is low, fill it to the max line but make sure you're using the right coolant for your car. Please use the same colour coolant as is in the system. If you're unsure what yours takes, give us a call at 01842 860226, and we'll assist you.

It is also important to check the condition of your coolant in the header tank; if it appears brown, sludgy, or even just watery, it's time to seek professional help as it could be an indication of bigger issues. As a rule of thumb if it looks like it has mavonnaise in it, there is a big issue, and it needs to be looked at!

If you would like us to check your levels, please don't forget we are open on a Saturday and we can check your levels or, give us a call on 01842 860226.

LAKENHEATH PARISH WALKS

akenheath is fortunate to have a good network of footpaths and the Parish Walk explores these every other Sunday afternoon, helping you to enjoy the beautiful area in which we live as well as keeping the footpaths open. Walking will give you new perspective on life as well as the opportunity to make new friends. You are welcome to join us for a walk on a Sunday afternoon. We meet at Wings Road Car Park at 2 pm but don't expect anyone there before 1.55pm. Walks are about 5 miles long and take about 2 hours. If we see hares, deer etc we stop and watch them. Sturdy footwear, preferably boots, is essential. There is no charge and evervone is welcome.

Walks are planned for the following Sundays, 10th September and every other Sunday thereafter. Dates are on the noticeboards at Wings Road Car Park, the Library and the Surgery. Or just turn up and, if we are not there, we should be there the following Sunday. We had some problems with illness and holidays in June and July so if you came and found we were not there, please do not give up but try again. If the weather is very hot we do not walk as it is dangerous to exercise in high temperatures.

UPDATED NEWS FOR LAKENHEATH WALKERS!

Last time I reported optimistically that the problems with overgrown footpaths in Lakenheath, had been solved. I was relying on the assurances of the County Council, which in turn were relying on the



assurances of the contractor. Although the contractor did cut at the beginning of 2023 some of the paths he had failed to cut in 2022, others were just left. Remedial work was also supposed to be carried out, but it was not done.

The path (Footpath 3) between Clavpits Bridge on the Undley Road and the path from the Community Centre is dangerous as the bushes have been allowed to grow up on top of the lode bank so you have to walk on the sloping side of the bank. Also at one point the load bank has been dug out leaving a steep slope on loose soil near the lode. The Parish walk no longer uses this path which restricts the walks we can do.

Other paths are also overgrown and should have been cut in May and should now be cut again, starting in August. I had a meeting with the County Rights of Way Officer on 19 May when we discussed the state of the paths and inspected some of them. I think the Officer now has a better understanding of how serious the situation is.

Suffolk Fire Service to bring control room back to the County

Suffolk Fire and Rescue Service has announced plans to create a new fire control centre here in Suffolk.

Since October 2011, Suffolk has shared a control room with Cambridgeshire and Peterborough Fire and Rescue Service in Huntingdon. The joint project has worked well, saving both fire services money and enabling greater crossborder resource sharing.

However, the company behind a project to deliver a new IT system, initiated in 2019, has run into technical and financial problems, causing a significant delay. This, in addition to advancements in technology, has led to the decision to bring fire control back into the county by the end of 2024.

Help for Suffolk Pre-payment Meter customers

A package of support has been created for pre-payment meter customers in Suffolk who are struggling with their energy bills.

Warm Homes Suffolk is a Suffolk-wide Council partnership service, delivering energy efficiency support to lowincome households affected by costof-living pressures.

Supported by Suffolk's Collaborative Communities Board and funding from Public Health Suffolk's Contain Outbreak Management Fund (COMF), the service is now able to offer specific help for households struggling to pay their energy bills via a pre-payment meter, in addition to its existing support.

The support covers the whole of Suffolk and is available for all residents, whether they are in social housing, council tenants, owner occupiers or private renters.

The Warm Homes Suffolk Service can check eligibility and support applications for grants to increase household energy efficiency, with measures such as loft and wall insulation to air source heat pumps. draught-proofing and more.

It is estimated that more than 24,000 people in Suffolk are pre-payment meter customers.

The service will work with each individual to understand the pressures on their finances and the impact this is having on their lives. The service can carry out a home visit, as well as providing advice over the phone and by email.

The COMF funding of £180,000 will enable this project to run for 12 months to provide the following:

- Income maximisation (through grants and benefits)
- Budgeting advice
- Help understanding bills and heating systems
- Support to reduce energy expenditure (By promoting social tariffs and support to switch suppliers)
- Improving household energy efficiency (By installing insulation, draught proofing, heating systems and solar panels)
- Facilitating switch away from prepaid meters if appropriate

"Ipswich ware" pottery made for the first time in over 1.000 years

"Ipswich ware" jars and pots, first made 1,400 years ago in Suffolk's County town, are being fired again in a replica Anglo-Saxon kiln.

Thanks to funding from The National Lottery Heritage Fund, this new experimental archaeology project is being led by Suffolk County Council Archaeological Service, to investigate how Anglo-Saxon pottery was once made in Ipswich.

The new Anglo-Saxon Ipswich ware kiln has been built and fired by studying archaeological remains excavated from the Buttermarket in lpswich, something never attempted before. Only two kilns have ever been excavated in Ipswich, the other was discovered at Stoke Quay.

Ipswich ware pottery was made in the town from c. AD 680-870. Jars,

cooking pots and pitchers were the most commonly made items, simple in design and grey in colour. They were mass-produced and distributed throughout eastern England and were some of the first of their kind in post-Roman Britain

Ancestry appointed to digitise Suffolk's popular family and local history sources

More than 400 years of fascinating historical documents held at Suffolk Archives are to be digitised and made available online, thanks to an agreement between Suffolk County Council and Ancestry.

Suffolk Archives will work alongside the family history website Ancestry to create high-quality, full-colour digital images of millions of baptism, marriage and burial records from parishes within the Diocese of St Edmundsbury and Ipswich.

The earliest records being digitised date back to 1538 and include events in the lives of notable historical figures, such as the 1776 baptism of landscape artist John Constable, and the 1846 burial of Thomas Clarkson who devoted his life to the abolition of slavery.

It is hoped that Suffolk's main parish records will be published online in early 2025 with other collections of local interest to follow. Public access will be free of charge in Suffolk Archives branches or at any Suffolk Library. Anyone with an Ancestry subscription will also be able to access the records as part of their research from their own computer or device.






